FIRST XI CRICKET

The side twice convincingly beat Kettering Grammar School. At home, Kettering batted first and, in another rain-interrupted innings, scored 66-1 declared. Batting in the rain, the School passed 66 for the loss of 2 wickets, Cooke making 41 not out. Away, the School batted first and declared at 83-4; Hortin 44. After tea Kettering were bowled out for 25; Partridge taking 4 for 4, including a hat-trick. Against Northampton Grammar School II the School were again unlucky. Batting first we made 140-4 declared; Cooke 47, Crane 44 not out, Hortin 44 not out. The Grammar had two hours to go for the runs but declined the offer and struggled to 62-5.

The teams' worst performance by far was against Magdalen College. After getting three quick wickets the School fielding slumped and Magdalen finally declared at tea at 100-7 wickets. The School just managed to hang on and finished at 53-3 wickets.

The best victory was against a strong British Timken side in a 20 overs evening game. Mr. Williams and Mr. Price were invited to play for the School team. The School batted first and, after the allotted overs, had made 93-4 wickets, Chapman 37. British Timken made a strong challenge but still needed 15 runs to win off the last over. They failed, and finished at 81-7 wickets.

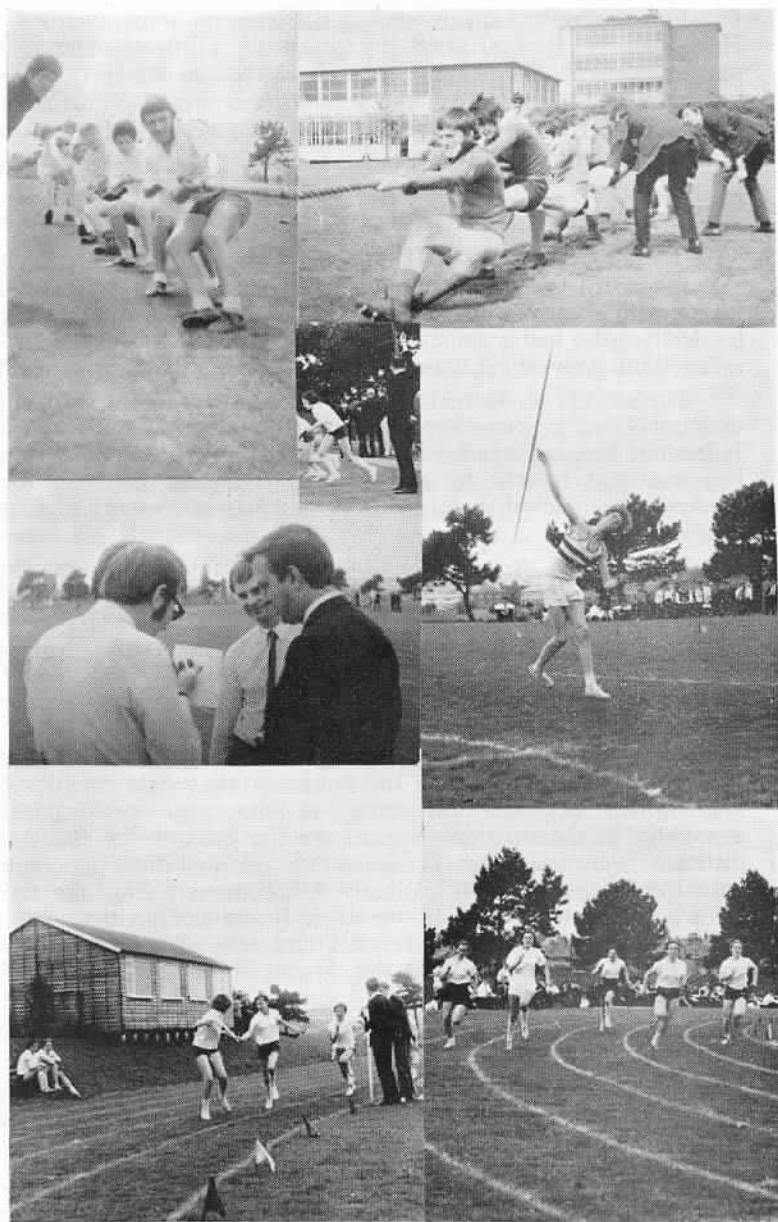
Sports Day itself was also wet in the morning and a decision to postpone it for a week was taken.

Competition for first team places was very fierce but those who were not lucky enough to get a first team place were quickly snapped up by the extra firsts. This resulted in the seconds having the best record of the club's three teams, losing one, drawing one and winning all the others. Once again, the colts' team comprised nearly all School lads. 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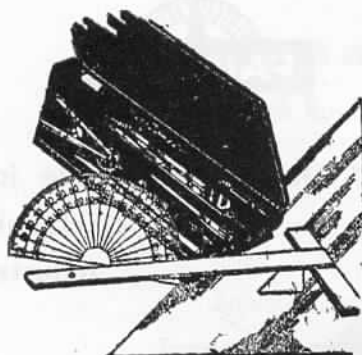


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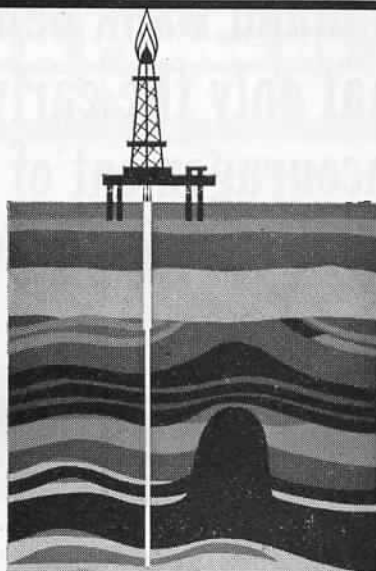
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
